Johnson, 29, is a trained chef and mother of three. What her family didn't lose to Katrina was lost in the months afterward in a series of relocations across three states. They finally arrived in Fayetteville this spring, where McGee's organization took them under its wing

"After all they'd been through, she could keep smiling," he said. "They're a special bunch, and we were determined to help

The children are enrolled in local schools now, Johnson has a home and hopes to start a new career as a caterer

"This is a good way for people to meet her and check out her cooking." McGee said. "I think they'll be impressed."

There's no charge for the gathering. though donations will be accepted.

"It's easy to think of the trials and forget the blessings." McGee said. "This is a chance to reflect on all of it.
